## Dear Friends,

A recent newspaper article made me ashamed to be British. It told the story of an asylum seeker who, having fled torture at home, was treated shamefully by the authorities here. He was deprived of his freedom without been convicted of any crime. He was so abused by those who held him, that when his case was eventually rejected he was relieved to seek refuge in another state.

Many of us will be aware of instances where foreign workers and their families have settled in this country, have built up relationships in the host community, sometimes being part of Anglican churches, and yet after two or three years been refused permission to stay.

What kind of society are we becoming that we should be so paranoid about asylum seekers? We are happy to welcome migrant workers from Eastern Europe, pay them a pittance, house them in barns, make them work exceptionally long hours doing back-breaking work in the fields for our short term economic benefit, and then refuse entry to those who desperately need our hospitality, and who would make a long term contribution to the economy of the country. Why do we welcome thousands of migrant workers but refuse entry to a few hundred asylum seekers?

I haven't yet seen 'Amazing Grace', but it is well known that Wilberforce was endowed with a passionate compassion for the treatment of slaves, and was willing to confront the established authorities with his vision of human dignity and worth. His conscience was supported by his Christian belief.

Many seem to believe that the quality of Christian compassion which motivated Wilberforce is something only for individuals and cannot impinge upon society. By his relentless campaigning Wilberforce proved otherwise. Jesus' message was the proclamation of the Kingdom of God. Yes, this was and is a spiritual kingdom, but it has social implications. It is a vision of social justice and love to which Christians of every denomination aspire.

When the risen Christ came and stood among his disciples, he reassured them, saying: "Peace be with you". In fact, in John's account he brought them more than peace, for he breathed into them the Holy Spirit. It was the Holy Spirit that transformed them from frightened disciples to courageous apostles, willing to confront the authorities with the good news of Jesus' risen life.

May is the month of local elections and we have the opportunity to exercise a little local democracy. I hope that both our local legislators and all of us who vote will also be motivated by courageous compassion and the values of the kingdom of God, rather than the culture of fear and cynicism which seems to be so pervasive.

Council minutes and details of planning applications can be viewed on the website, which also gives access to parish, district and county council services. A brief review of a few items discussed by Repton Parish Council at the meeting held on 16th April.

> As this was the last meeting of the current parish council before the local elections on 3rd May, those members who are not seeking reelection were warmly thanked for their work on behalf of our community over many years. There are eleven seats on the parish council, and by coincidence eleven candidates have been nominated; this means there will not be the expense of a contested election this time. The composition of the new council will be announced as soon as councillors assume office in May.

 $\succ$  During gales in January a large tree was blown down across the popular footpath that runs from the village, alongside the brook, to Sledge Wood. Many people have complained about the delay in clearing the blockage. After repeated efforts by the parish council to engineer its removal, SDDC has at last advised that they will ensure it is dealt with this month.

> There is concern for the wellbeing of a flowering cherry tree beside the Cinder Track, near the new houses that are being built there. A letter has been sent to the developer asking that he take particular care to ensure it is not damaged. The tree is quite old and enquiries are being made about having it professionally pruned. It's difficult to see what else can be done - more ornamental trees along this path would be attractive, but vandals have sabotaged previous plantings.

> A proposal to erect a 'Jumbrella' at the rear of the Bulls Head, to provide cover for a dining area on the rear patio, was one of four planning applications considered. There were no objections to any.

> Plans were laid to hire play equipment for the free use and enjoyment of local children one afternoon a week during the summer holidays. Anything to get them from under their parent's feet and keep them out of mischief has to be welcomed! The items being requested from SDDC are a skateboard park, climbing wall, sportsmobile and laser games. More details of time, location, age groups, etc., will be widely advertised near the date. This type of equipment is quite expensive to hire, so let's all hope it's put to good use.

Repton Village Hall Management Committee has submitted a bid to the Big Lottery Fund (BLF) for support to demolish the village hall and replace it with a slightly larger, more flexible building designed to modern standards.

The village hall is a major focus of activity in Repton. It supports nearly 40 local societies and interest groups, as well as private parties. In 2006 it was used on 505 occasions by 38 organisations, and 79 times by private users. We cannot accommodate everyone, and in particular there is an unmet demand for small rooms. As the only hall locally that can affordably house large gatherings it is indispensable and often packed for events such as: the Village Show; Open Gardens teas; concerts, plays and shows; suppers; art, flower and history displays; dances; quizzes; talks; sales. The hall is classed as a 'Strategic Hall' by South Derbyshire District council. It is the nominated place of safety in Repton Primary School's emergency plan. It is also the local polling station.

#### What's wrong with the present building?

The village hall opened in October 1971. It is timber-framed and relies on the infill panels to provide lateral stability. In the early 1970's the structural uprights at the north end were cut through to make a stage. The resulting weakness caused the stage lintel to drop and the roof to sag. Apart from that, it has been carefully maintained, and has survived at least a decade past its 25 year design life. Now, however, a survey has found significant rot in both the wooden structure and the infill panels. We are advised that repair would not be cost-effective.

Apart from that: disabled access is poor; there are no disabled toilets; the kitchen is not suitable for food preparation and does not meet current good practice; the hall is very inflexible; the building is poorly insulated and wastes energy.

#### How does the bid for lottery funding work?

As we are applying for a great deal of money, about £400,000, there are two stages to the bid. Initially, in stage 1, we have to convince the BLF that we have a case. If we clear that hurdle (and the BLF has money left over from the London Olympics!), we move on to stage 2 and will be given a grant to cover the cost of all the professional work needed to prepare detailed plans: architect; quantity surveyor; structural engineer; planning applications; building regulations; site investigation; construction; design and management regulations; asbestos survey; site decontamination; archaeological survey. At the same time, we shall be canvassing ideas again as to what you want to see in the new hall.

The BLF will not fund the whole redevelopment; we shall have to find well over  $\pounds 100,000$  from our own resources, and from appeals locally.

### Parking - the police can prosecute if necessary

The Parish Council has received complaints about cars and vans parked on the grass verges and the pavements in Repton. The council feels strongly that the verges are a part of Repton's character, and it is important to keep them in good condition. The District Council has a contract to mow the verges, but when these are rutted they are very difficult to maintain; they also look unsightly and spoil the village.

If you park your vehicles on the pavement you are causing an obstruction. The local police will be looking into complaints and can prosecute if necessary. We know that it can be difficult to park at the roadside, but if you park on the path and block it completely, then pedestrians, pushchairs and wheelchairs are forced onto the road to get past. This is dangerous for them and we feel sure that it is not what you intend.

Please do try to park considerately.

### The Garden in May

There are many plants that help to fill the gap in the border before high summer. And many of these can be out of the way by the middle of June. Aquilegia and honesty seed prolifically. Iris japonica, Solomon's seal, late flowering tulips and the first of the lupins are useful. Oriental poppies come in different colours.

Papaver Perry's White, Patty's Plum, Black and White, and Goliath - a dark red, also know as Beauty of Livermore - are all reliable varieties, and there are also pinks and the original oranges.

Paeonies are available in a good range of colours and varieties, and some have fine foliage: p. tenuifolia has finely dissected leaves and crimson flowers; p. obovata has single white flowers; p. cambessedesii has glaucous sea-green leaves, whilst p. mlokosewitschii is a well known favourite with large, single, yellow flowers, and dark purple emerging shoots.

Prick out bedding plants sown earlier and harden them off before planting out. Plant up containers, but don't put them out too early. Plant out sweet peas previously sown in a cold frame; seed sown outside now will flower in mid to late summer. Taller plants in the border will need staking.

If necessary, prune forsythia, winter jasmine and evergreen, spring flowering ceanothus after flowering. Tie in climbers, especially clematis and roses. Give clematis a spring feed with tomato feed or similar. Where the large flowered clematis often die from clematis wilt, the smaller flowered varieties, such as c.macropetala and c. alpina, and the later flowering viticellas seem to be immune.

Sow French and runner beans under glass or directly outside. Both can be damaged by frost and need a temperature of at least 12°C to germinate. Sow marrows in pots or mudules under glass. Peppers sown under glass in March should be ready for planting on, and tomatoes can be planted in a frost-free greenhouse. Celery sown in February can be planted out now. Continue successional sowings of lettuce, salad onions, cabbages and other brassicas, beetroot and carrot.

Thinning carrots bruises the foliage and releases the scent, attracting carrot fly. The fly lays its eggs near the plants in April and May. After a week the larvae hatch and enter the carrots. A second generation appears later in the summer. It also attacks parsnip, celery and parsley. The first sign of attack is stunted growth and reddening of the foliage. Protect carrots by covering with a fine mesh. Growing them next to onions also seems to help.

Lay straw under strawberries to keep the fruit clean. Tidy up hellebores, mulch and apply a general fertiliser. At the same time, tidy pulmonaria and euphorbia. Euphorbia sap can be an irritant, so wear long sleeves and gloves.

Control aphids by encouraging beneficial insects, particularly ladybirds, lacewings and hover flies, and the plants they feed on; they prefer single flowers where the nectar and pollen are more readily accessible. It also helps to recognise their larvae. Ladybird larvae are fairly large, black with yellow spots. Chemical sprays are indiscriminate, so if you feel you must spray, do so late in the day. Contact sprays may miss the insects hidden under curled leaves, so systemic sprays are more effective, killing insects as they suck the sap. Sprays with bifenthrin seem to be safest. Biological controls are also available, but are really only effective in greenhouses or frames, and are dependent on a temperature of 16°C or thereabouts.

Butterflies have been about earlier this year. Brimstones often appear from hibernation on a warm day in late February. Peacocks, small tortoiseshells and commas also hibernate, and appear in April and May, when the orange tip will appear with the holly blue. The caterpillars of small tortoiseshells, commas, peacocks and red admirals all feed on nettles. Flowers, particularly single flowers, where the nectar and pollen are the most accessible, are the main food source for adult butterflies, although other flowers such as buddleja, scabious, echinacea and eupatorium are great favourites. Some will also feed on tree sap and the sugary secretions from aphids and overripe fruit. *Ken Robinson*
